I was hoping to hear an actual book read by Dr. Sproul! This is a fantastic series by Sproul. Do not get it confused with the book "The Holiness Of God" Dr. Sproul's narration is the same as his daily ministry programs. He does an excellent job communicating such an important topic. Over the years, I've come to deeply value R. C. Sproul's exegetical approach to Scripture and his reverence for God's beauty, wisdom, and holiness. The first five or six chapters of this book explore God's holiness--transcendence, justice, omniscience, etc.--based on the book of Isaiah in a very insightful way. However, the last few chapters of the book surprised me. Sproul typically explains, rather than dramatizing his subject, but the last few chapters of this book degenerate into reconstructing Isaiah's experiences (beyond the words of the biblical text) and dramatic depictions of Isaiah's emotions at God's terrifying holiness. A lot of adjectives, repeated calls for the reader/listener to be struck with fear and awe. While we certainly should be struck with awe of God, the Christian's relationship with God is more than fear! The second half of the book did not really allow the text to speak for itself, nor did Sproul discuss those steps in depth: theological or practical applications for the lives of the believer and unbeliever. Perhaps the final chapters could have explored God's holiness as displayed by both God the Father and Jesus Christ in relation to the Gospel. Frank Darnall Jr. 02-28-15 Love how R.C. This is a great series of lectures, but it's not the same version as the book. In others words, the content of this audiobook and the actual text don't match. Still glad I got it though! Great! BUT! I wish it was shown that these are live lectures, not a book. If you think you have a good understanding of God's holiness, listen to Dr. Sproul's thoughts on it. We don't understand how "other" God is from us, and therefore don't understand His complete holiness. We humans are born sinners. We can't expect God's grace, because grace is voluntary. "Don't ever ask God for justice; you might get it." (Ch. 15, 19:10) The only way that God will bestow His incredible grace and mercy on me or you is for each to accept the one and only way He has provided for that to happen: by accepting the sacrifice His Son, Jesus, made on the cross, and His resurrection from the dead. Only the blood of Jesus can make a sinful human acceptable in the eyes of this holy God.This book is not a book of sermons: it is like sitting down next to Dr. Sproul and listening to him reason with you as to why "God is holy and we are not." I'm two chapters in and it varies quite a lot from what I can see compared to my kindle version of the book.I'm getting a refund and the proper unabridged version.This should not be listed as an audiobook in unabridged format. But as abridged radio, speech or lecture... Holiness, as Sproul writes, is a difficult concept for humans to understand and define. It is best understood by experience or by story. Sproul does attempt to define it, but it is best truly understood by stories, anecdotes, and analogy.To this end, most of the book is Sproul examining personal stories that demonstrate holiness, but more importantly, and more extensively, he looks at the Bible to show what Scripture has to say about holiness.Early on he looks at the Lord's Prayer, and notes tha Holiness, as Sproul writes, is a difficult concept for humans to understand and define. It is best understood by experience or by story. 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As Sproul later shows, God is holy and his holiness is a consuming fire. Even Moses was too unholy to see more than the back of God through the crack of a rock. This is a shocking thing, when one ponders it.Some of the most helpful parts of the book are Sproul's examination of the deaths of Nahab, Abihu, and Uzza. They all died because they broke the law of God in rebellious, public ways. God struck Nahab and Abihu dead for offering "strange fire." Sproul shows the true rebellious nature of their sin. He also shows the casual nature the ark of God was treated by Uzza and his throng as they transported it. Uzza's touching it was the culmination of a heinous sin, not a simple slip of his hand.It is one thing to be shocked by these stories, but another to stands as God's judge because of them. These are shocking things because God is holy and we are not. We rarely understand the meaning of this. We must bow the knee and worship, not place ourselves as the judge of God's actions or character.Another very helpful passage was Sproul's treatment of the Rich Young Ruler who claims to have kept all the laws of God. Jesus tells him to "go and sell all you possess and give to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; and come, follow Me." As Sproul notes, this is a frequently misunderstood passage. Many use it as an example to show that we should "get rid of all private property." Many others show rather, that the Rich Young Ruler is unwilling to give up an idol--his riches. This is true, but Sproul helpfully frames this in the context of the Ten Commandments. He writes:"If we speculate and try to get into the secret recesses of Jesus' mind, we can imagine a thought process that went something like this: Oh, you have kept all the commandments since you were a child. Well, let's see. What is the first commandment? Oh, yes, "You shall have no other gods before me. " Let's see how you do with that one. Jesus put him to the test. If anything in the rich man's life came before God, it was his money. Jesus set the challenge precisely at this point, at the point of the man's obedience to commandment number one: "Go, sell all that you have...." What did the man do? How did he handle his only blemish? He walked away sorrowfully, for he had great possessions. The man was put to the test of the Ten Commandments, and he flunked out after the first question. The point of this narrative is not to lay down a law that a Christian must get rid of all private property. The point is for us to understand what obedience is and what goodness actually requires. Jesus called the man's bluff, and the man folded."I suppose this is not a radical insight, but it is one that I'd missed in my reading. This is the kind of thing found throughout the book. I highly recommend it--particularly to young readers, as it is not a difficult to understand book, but it is often difficult to read as it puts man in his place.more

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
